Here we are 2/3 of the way through 2011 and we have had some great events during this past year! Thank you to Jim Neitzel for his presentation on mango's during the July meeting and a BIG Thank You to everyone who pitched in to make the mango and ice cream social such a yummy event. We are working on a couple more tastings before the year is over, so keep a watch out for these opportunities and be sure to come to the monthly meetings to take part in these events.

We have a couple of exciting events this month that are occurring in addition to our regular monthly meeting. The 1st is our Chapter picnic and workshop day on Saturday August 20th, 2011 at the South Bay Botanic Garden at Southwestern College. The day will begin at 9:00 A.M. with preparing plants for the Chapter plant sale at the South Bay Green Scene on August 27th. If you have any plants that you would be willing to donate to the Chapter for the sale, please bring them by 11:00 so that we can prepare them for the 27th. We will also be having some maintenance projects in our fruit collection and will be planting some new fruiting plants as additions to the garden. Some of the hands-on morning projects will include:

- Learning how to prep nursery stock for sale
- Summer care for blueberries
- Mulching for healthy soil, healthy roots, healthy plants -- and less weeds!
- Banana care and maintenance

Please come to help in the garden and to learn from some of our experienced members. This is a great opportunity to ask questions, share ideas and to get to know our fellow members. **All volunteers who come to help on these projects and arrive before 11:00 A.M. will get a raffle ticket for a chance to win 1 of 5 gift certificates for \$25.00 to D.Z. Akins.** Drawing will be at 1:15.

The Chapter potluck picnic will occur from 12:00 until 1:30 P.M. The Chapter will provide hot dogs, hamburgers and veggie burgers, condiments, paper plates, utensils and lemonade. Please come and join in on the festivities and bring a dish or beverages to share with our members. **We will be giving away 3 - 15 gallon Valencia orange trees as raffle prizes at the picnic, and all attendees who come to the picnic will receive a ticket for a chance to win one of these great trees.** Drawing will be at 1:15.

After lunch, we will be having 4 blocks of hands-on propagation workshops with each workshop having several instructors and with lots of material for members to practice with. We will be able to use the propagation greenhouse and the plant material in the garden for our workshops and everyone will get to learn hands-on in each of the workshops. Please bring your own pruners or grafting knife for these workshops if you have them.

The 1st workshop begins at 1:30 and will feature propagation by cuttings. We will have plant material to use as cutting material and the class will also discuss propagation soils. These cuttings will be grown in the greenhouse at Southwestern College for our Chapter to use at the 2012 Chapter plant sales, opportunity table and other events. Feel free to bring any material that you might be willing to share as cutting material.

The 2nd workshop will begin at 2:00 and will be on budding and grafting. Chapter has many ungrafted rootstocks at the College and we will bring scion to use to graft these for the Chapter. Again these trees will be used at future Chapter plant sales or for the opportunity table, so this will be a great way for members to get grafting and budding practice, one on one instruction and benefit the Chapter.

The 3rd workshop will be on air-layering beginning at 2:30. We will have members prepare air-layer bags and apply them to trees at the College. Once rooted, these plants will again provide additional plants for Chapter activities.

The 4th and last workshop will be on top working mature trees. By using bark grafting techniques, we will change a large rough lemon tree that grew as a root sucker into several varieties of good citrus fruit. This will be a good opportunity for members to learn and practice this technique for adding varieties to or changing the variety of a larger tree.

Members will have the opportunity to stay and practice in a workshop, or they can move to the next workshop. At 3:45 the day will end and we will need volunteers to help the Chapter clean-up so that everyone can go home by 4:00. Please note there is a flyer on this day's events in this newsletter so that everyone can easily see the what, where and when of this picnic. **There will be free parking in Lot E Only! Be sure to park in this lot!**

The South Bay Green Scene will be held at this same location (the South Bay Botanic Garden at Southwestern College) on the following Saturday August 27th, 2011. This is a great garden event with many vendors of plants and gardening products, agencies and plant organizations. Our Chapter will be having a community outreach booth and plant sale at this event. The hours for we will need help will be from 8-4:30 or so. Please contact Erik Collins if you would be willing to help our Chapter on this event. (619) 303-5353.

David Yetz will be our presenter at the August 24th meeting and will be giving a presentation on drought tolerant fruiting plants. Dave works at the Water Conservation Garden at Cuyamaca College and will have great information and ideas to share at this meeting. Vice Chair Notes by Jim Neitzel

First of all, thanks to all the helpers that volunteered to prepare the various bowls of peeled and diced mango for adding to the delicious vanilla ice cream that Erik picked up from Costco. A helping hand when in need is great indeed! Those big, fat, high-shouldered 'Kent' mangos are still available most of July. Go buy a box and enjoy! I was surprised that the smaller, yellow manila-type 'Ataulfo' (aka "Champagne") were also still available for our July meeting. If you have trouble finding these tasty varieties, try some of the Asian stores. September into October the big oval-shaped and greenish 'Keitt' mangoes wrap up the regular season. This is the variety grown commercially near the Salton Sea and largely shipped to Japan as of late.

The countries in the southern hemisphere step in to fill the gap – Ecuador, Peru, and Brazil, mostly. The mango fans are obliged to accept the reliable non-perishable staple 'Tommy Atkins' fruits for a few months. Then the cycle of "winners" become available from South America. Learn to look on the end of the box for the checked-off cultivar names or to ID them by appearance. Stores seem increasingly reluctant to label with variety names in their quest to go generic.

I apologize for the reduced numbers of members present to be on our "mango panel" on July 27. David Archer and Paul Fisher couldn't make it. Leo Manuel and I are setting up a Saturday garden tour of his impressive Rancho Peñasquitos mango collection. Sign up with Karen Lakomy at the membership table if interested.

Leo remarked that he likes Kellogg's "Patio plus" mix in taller containers for planting mango seeds. Remove the bean-shaped kernel from the husk by carefully shaving away the upper dorsal side and prying open the ventral side. This fuzzy side opens easily, but take care not to damage the baby root (radical). Soak kernel in water a few days to remove all seed coat. Plant nice white kernels with the "hump" up and exposed a bit. Leo has several good seedling varieties he has developed this way. Many S.E. Asian varieties are polyembryonic so their seedlings are apt to be "true" to their parent tree (and not need to be grafted). Seedlings may bloom in 4-5 years.

The need to spray blooms and new growth to prevent any destructive mildew and for immediate pruning out all signs of anthracnose (a "black stem" affliction like fire blight in pome fruit) was discussed.

The regular CRFG meeting on the 24th will feature a presentation by David Yetz on drought tolerant fruit tree options. This topic should tie in to this year's "Festival of Fruit" in Phoenix.

Also, it relates to an excellent article by Ruth Newell in the August 4 SD Reader, pp. 34-38, titled Temporary Eden. The Fallbrook – Rainbow area is known as the avocado capital of the world, but its annual rainfall is only 16 inches. Avocado and citrus trees require lots of irrigation. "When only 3 percent of water on Earth is fit for human consumption," she feels it's foolhardy to not use reclaimed water, household "grey water" and rain harvesting possibilities first. She especially decries the use of potable water on the 4 golf courses in this aforementioned area. By the way, I understand that grey water systems (use) is now legal in our area!

Secretary's Report by Mark Bendixen

Requesting all plant liners {seedling tubes} and crates (3) be returned. We have only received 9 so far out of 100. 91 are still outstanding, so please bring them in to this month's meeting. To get a great price on propagation stock we have to return the liners and crates. Thank you to all that were able to participate in this event.

August Meeting will be on drought tolerant fruits.

Picnic potluck at Southwestern College a great day is planned, so come enjoy food, fun and friends.

Treasurer's Report by Erik Collins

As of July 31, 2011 we have \$8,822.44 in the operating account, and \$38,721.37 in the endowment account. I'm forecasting net income of \$4,810.21 for 2011, versus the 2011 Original Budget that shows zero net income.

It is recommended that most non-profits keep the equivalent of 12 months operating expenses in reserve. I'm forecasting \$3,000 in operating expenses for FY 2011, versus a budget of \$4,117. For the sake of conservatism, I'm saying that we should maintain a minimum balance of \$4,117 in our primary checking account. Therefore, we have \$4,705 in "excess reserves" in the checking account (\$8,822 minus \$4,117 = \$4,705).

As most of you have probably noticed, real interest rates on all types of bank accounts are now negative. The nominal interest rate on our checking account is .1%, minus 5% inflation, gives us a real rate of minus 4.9% per year. Our bank accounts – including the Paul Thompson Endowment – are losing about 5% of their purchasing power each year.

Which gets me to the point. The Board is looking at ways to gradually draw-down these "excess reserves". No decisions have been made, but we are tossing around ideas. If anybody has any good ideas, please contact Erik at sonicpig@hotmail.com. We will be discussing ideas at future Board meetings.

Finally, a couple of comments about our "Buy Local, Save \$\$" account at Grangetto's. First, somebody opened a second CRFG account last April. This is a "pay full price, no discount account". I made a purchase today, and I defaulted to the "pay full price account", not our discount account. Grangetto's has shut down this unauthorized account. Whoever opened this account has terrible negotiating skills. So, if you made any purchases since April, you may have paid full price. Second, Grangetto's is happy with the CRFG account, so they have bumped us up from 'medium-size account' to 'large-size account'. The Grangetto's pricing is excellent on bulk items. I purchase organic & synthetic fertilizers, peat moss, and perlite from them. Plus, we don't pay any sales tax on fertilizer. Just tell the cashier that you are a member of the "California Rare Fruit Growers".

Valencia orange trees

Last spring we received an email from the Master Gardeners that a park in Irvine was giving away 2500 Valencia orange trees to nonprofit organizations.

It was a good opportunity but the problem was transportation and storage of 15 gallon trees until they are collected by the schools and community gardens. José Gallego graciously volunteered to help pick up the trees and store them so the Endowment Committee sent emails out to the schools and community gardens. We received 23 requests for between 63 to 70 trees.

All this was well and good, but the problems started when we could not get a confirmation for picking them up from Irvine. The first delay was the trees needed to be treated for Citrus Psyllids so they could be transported in a quarantine area. Next it was lack of communication on when we could pick them up and how many we could receive. What was supposed to take 3 weeks turned into 3 months with no resolve.

Finally José got a call on July 19th, Tuesday morning from the park service saying he could only pick up the trees that afternoon or two days later on July 21 and only between 530pm and 730pm. Talk about short notice after waiting for months. José took the afternoon off from work and sprang into action. He called David Archer who graciously offered to help drive a truck; they rented two full sized covered panel trucks, hired help to load up, and were on the road at 3:30 Tuesday afternoon.

It was a long trip. They didn't leave Irvine until 10:15 pm and got home after 11:30 pm. They were able to get our 70 trees for the schools that requested them with 10 more just in case, PLUS they picked up the 40 for the Master Gardeners who were unable to go on such short notice.

José took 80 trees at his house and is caring for them now and Dave Archer took the 40 that belong to the Master Gardeners to his nursery. We hope to have all of ours distributed to the schools and gardens by the first week September and take any left over to the Southwestern Green Scene.

I would like to give a huge thank you to José Gallego and David Archer for helping to make this happen. José took the lead with organizing the event and kept pestering the Park service until they finally called with the tree availability. David helped organize getting the trucks and handling the logistics of picking up the Master Gardener trees along with ours. This could never have happened without both of their time and effort.

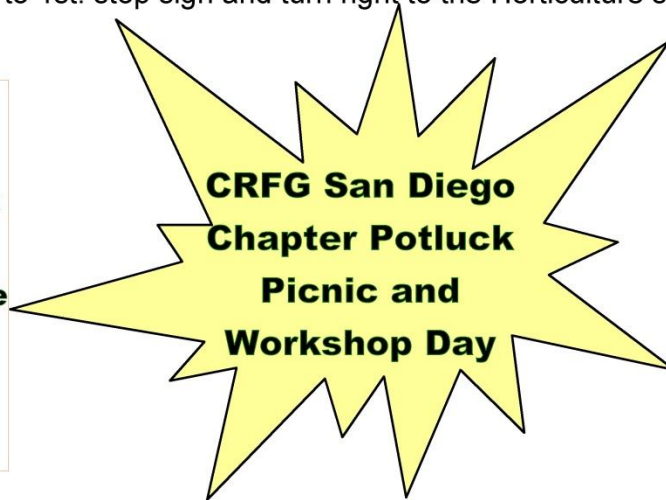
